Lambing Service



All Hymn numbers taken from Hymns Old and New (HO&N) (New Anglican Edition, 1996) or Seasonal Worship from the Countryside (SWC)

This service would be suitable for other occasions during the year where shepherds meet, such as at sheep dog trials.

The 'wisdom of the ewes' in the prayers refers to the good sense and innate knowledge that upland sheep at least are endowed with: they are said to be 'hefted' to their territory, knowing its boundaries, where to find water, which places are dangerous and which provide shelter and safety. This knowledge is imparted to their lambs, so they can pass it on in their turn. If sheep have to be brought in from outside, they have no local knowledge and there are more accidents and casualties. At first, the owner has to spend time every day rounding them up and bringing back any that have strayed - perhaps rather like the shepherd in the Parable of the Lost Sheep!

Reading (Isaiah 40: 9, 11; Author's own version)

Isaiah says the Lord is near and is a shepherd to his people



You who bring good tidings to Zion go up on to a high mountain,
You who bring good tidings to Jerusalem,
lift up your voice with a shout,
lift it up, do not be afraid;
say to the cities of Judah:
Behold your God! Behold the Lord!
He looks after his flock like a shepherd,
he picks up the lambs in his arms,
and gently leads the pregnant ewes.

Hymn Father, hear the prayer we offer (HO&N 120)

Reading (John 10: 14-16 NIV)

I am the good shepherd; I know my sheep and my sheep know me - just at the Father knows me and I know the Father - and I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that are not of this fold. I must bring them also. They will listen to my voice, and there shall be one flock and one shepherd.

Reading (Luke15: 3-7 NIV)

Then Jesus told them this parable, 'Suppose one of you has a hundred sheep and loses one of them. Does he not leave the ninety-nine in the open country and go after the lost sheep until he finds it? And when he finds it, he joyfully puts it on his shoulders and goes home. Then he calls his friends and neighbours together and says, "Rejoice with me; I have found my lost sheep". I tell you that in the same way there will be more rejoicing in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who do not need to repent.'
